



FOSTERING ARTISTIC-AESTHETIC THINKING IN STUDENTS THROUGH MUSIC AND VISUAL ARTS LESSONS

In his work **The Virtuous City** (Al-Madina al-Fadila), Abu Nasr Al-Farabi emphasizes moral and spiritual maturity, the appreciation of beauty, and the pursuit of art as the foundations of a virtuous society. According to him, beauty is the harmony of thought and feeling, and this harmony shapes the perfect human being. Ibn Sina, meanwhile, provided a medical-psychological rationale for the importance of music, poetry, painting, and other artistic activities in human upbringing. In his view, aesthetic education is interpreted not merely as a source of spiritual pleasure but also as a means of fostering mental health and spiritual harmony. Alisher Navoi, for his part, regarded aesthetic education in his creative work as a primary instrument for guiding individuals toward perfection. Notably, his **Khamsa** epic poems celebrate human virtues—such as compassion, love, and justice—through refined emotions, artistic beauty, and poetic imagery. The Jadid enlighteners, meanwhile, viewed aesthetic education as a means to awaken the people, elevate the national consciousness, and raise a young generation characterized by sound judgment and refined artistic taste [3].



Music is a powerful tool for shaping the musical and aesthetic culture of young people. History knows of no civilization or great thinker untouched by musical culture. The foundation of developing a young person's musical and spiritual culture lies in the perception of music. Through the process of perceiving music, their life and musical experiences expand; they begin not merely to listen to music but to analyze it. It is at this point that musical culture truly fulfills its aesthetic function. Thus, a well-structured musical-aesthetic education enriches the spirituality of young people and plays a vital role in their development into worthy citizens of their country[4].

Music and the visual arts serve as educational tools that directly influence students' emotional worlds, fostering their ability to perceive, feel, and creatively express beauty. Through these subjects, students acquire the skills to perceive, analyze, and evaluate works of art, thereby developing their artistic and aesthetic thinking [5].

Artistic-aesthetic thinking refers to an individual's ability to perceive beauty in art and reality, to make aesthetic judgments, and to express this beauty through creative activity. Consequently, the effective organization of music and fine arts instruction in general education schools is a pressing pedagogical task.

The theoretical foundations of the concept of artistic-aesthetic thinking are outlined below. In the fields of pedagogy and aesthetics, artistic-aesthetic thinking is interpreted as a form of human aesthetic consciousness. It emerges from the harmonious interplay of sensory perception, aesthetic judgment, imagery-based thinking, and creative activity [6].

According to psychologists, regular engagement with works of art develops students' emotional intelligence, broadens their imagination, and fosters creative thinking skills [7].

Music lessons play a role in fostering artistic-aesthetic thinking. Music is an art form that profoundly influences human emotions. Through listening to, singing, analyzing, and performing melodies and songs during music lessons, students gain aesthetic experience [8].

Music education offers the following pedagogical possibilities: First, music enriches students' emotional lives. Musical works of various characters evoke feelings of joy, wonder, delight, and inspiration within the human spirit.

Second, music cultivates aesthetic taste. By listening to examples of national and world music, students learn to distinguish artistic values.



Third, music fosters creative thinking. Musical improvisation, rhythmic exercises, and performance activities shape students' ability to think independently.

Furthermore, music lessons serve to foster an appreciation of national values. Through Uzbek classical music, the art of “maqom”, and folk songs, a sense of national identity is cultivated in the younger generation [9].

Visual arts lessons play a crucial role in shaping aesthetic thinking. Visual arts serve as a vital pedagogical tool for developing students' ability to think in terms of imagery. Through activities such as drawing, composing, exploring color harmony, and analyzing artworks, students acquire aesthetic knowledge [10].

The primary objectives of visual arts lessons are:

- fostering creativity;
- instilling national and universal values.

Professionals in every field need to convey complex ideas through schematics, diagrams, drawings, sketches, or models. Consequently, the study of visual arts fosters visual thinking, spatial imagination, and analytical skills in students. However, general secondary education institutions do not aim to provide in-depth, specialized training in the visual, applied, or architectural arts. Their primary objective is to instill general, foundational artistic knowledge and skills, spark an interest in art, and shape a worldview grounded in aesthetic values [12].

The pedagogical potential of integrating music and visual arts is described in greater detail below. Interdisciplinary integration is becoming increasingly important in modern education. Integrating music and visual arts enables students to perceive art holistically. For instance, students might be tasked with creating an image that reflects the content of a specific musical piece while listening to it. Alternatively, the connections between different forms of art can be revealed by analyzing musical compositions alongside the works of famous painters. Integrated lessons yield the following results:

- aesthetic perception is enhanced;
- creative thinking is developed;
- interest in art increases;
- emotional and intellectual development is fostered;
- communicative competencies are formed.



Research indicates that integrative education increases students' interest in art by 20–30 percent and significantly boosts their creative engagement [13].

The importance of modern pedagogical technologies is highly relevant today. The use of modern pedagogical technologies in music and fine arts lessons enhances the effectiveness of aesthetic education.

Such technologies include:

- interactive methods;
- project-based learning;
- the STEAM approach;
- information and communication technologies;
- multimedia tools;
- creative assignments.

Interactive methods encourage students to engage in active thinking. Works of art are analyzed in greater depth through group work, discussions, and presentations. The project method, meanwhile, facilitates independent creative activity among students; for instance, through a project titled "Studying Examples of National Art," students explore the historical evolution of music and the visual arts.

The use of ICT tools—such as virtual museums and audio-visual materials—expands the possibilities for aesthetic education [14].

There are methodological recommendations for developing artistic-aesthetic thinking in students. The following recommendations are considered important for fostering this type of thinking:

3. Extensive use of creative assignments.
4. Organizing integrated lessons.
5. Utilizing examples of national and world art.

These recommendations serve to enrich students' aesthetic worldview and foster a conscious appreciation of art.
